Banned books have been in the news the past few months. Here are some links to various lists of the top ten banned books by year and the top banned books through the years.

- violence
- LGBTQIA+ issues

What is the difference between a challenge or banning a book?

A challenge means that someone has questioned inclusion of the book in a library or in the curriculum. This person wants the book to be removed and restrict access to it by others. A reconsideration committee must review the item and decide whether or not to censor (ban) the book.

For middle and high school students, Lit2Go is a fantastic free site for stories and poems read by real people (not computer voices) in MP3 (audiobook) format. Discover an assortment of FREE MP3audiobooks that you and your students can listen to. Sorted by genre, readability, author, title, and collections, you can find dozens of books and poems in this free collection.

The genres that are included are adventure, epic, essay, fables, fairy tales and folk tales, fantasy, gothic, historical fiction, history, horror, informational, memoir, mystery, nursery rhyme, philosophy, poetry, realism, romance, satire, science fiction, speech, and tragedy.

An abstract, citation, playing time, and word count are given for each passage. Many of the passages include reading strategies as well.

From *The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn*, *The Wizard of Oz*, and *Grimm's Fairy Tales*, to poems by Edgar Allan Poe and more, this is an amazing free collection. You can either read the text and listen to the audio books immediately online or download them to iTunes. Each reading passage can also be downloaded as a PDF.

What an excellent way to get students interested in reading with their ears!
